1957



- **Concerned for the spiritual needs of the area, Irene May, a member of Godalming Baptist Church, started a mid week Bible study along with family and friends, in her home in Binscombe village.**
- **She had been inspired in a Bible study by Proverbs 29:18, *'Where there is no vision, the people perish'*.**
- **Every home in the area was visited and people personally invited to attend the meetings at her bungalow 'Timbers'.**

1958

- **With ongoing visiting of homes in the area, numbers grew at 'Timbers' until the kitchen, hall and lounge were packed with people.**
- **Some became Christians, others returned to churches they had long since stopped attending.**
- **A Sunday School was also started for the children of the area.**

- **A Christian mission for adults and children was held by Jim Bathgate of 'Counties Work', increasing the Sunday School attendance at 'Timbers'.**
- **This was so popular that most rooms in the bungalow had to be used for teaching. The garden was also used.**



- The Binscombe housing estate was designed and built soon after the Second World War, with a plot of land at the junction of Barnes and Loseley Road designated as a site for worship.

1961

- **With the local population growing, Irene May and her family called a meeting on 10th February to discuss building a hall on this site. Thirty eight people attended.**
- **50 local Christians agreed to support this initiative. Not all would join the proposed church but all promised support.**
- **These Christians came from a variety of denominations but most were associated with either Baptists or Brethren Churches.**
- **Committee member Malcolm Campbell writes: *'There is in my opinion a very real opportunity here to commence something along New Testament lines. The land cries out to be possessed and a progressive and live evangelical witness would fill a great need.'***

1962

- **Sunday evening meetings were held at 'Timbers' for worship and Bible teaching; first monthly, then fortnightly.**
- **Numbers steadily increased with up to 60 people regularly cramming into the bungalow.**
- **Thursday evening prayer meetings and Bible studies were started.**
- **The group was officially formed as the 'Binscombe Christian Fellowship'.**
- **In response to prayer, money was given towards a church hall and classrooms.**

- **The Chairman of the Binscombe Christian Fellowship wrote to the local paper explaining the vision for the church.**

To the Editor

Dear Sir,—Having read the report concerning the land available for Church purposes on the Binscombe Estate, we wish to emphasise that the Binscombe Christian Fellowship was formed to serve the general community in the Binscombe area. Our aim is to provide as speedily as possible a place of worship to which all may come, and extend the activities which are already in being.

A Sunday School for children in the area meets in a private house, where accommodation is taxed to the utmost and an extremely flourishing Women's Fellowship meets on the same premises.

As soon as accommodation is available it is hoped a Boys' Club will be housed in the building, together with a Youth Club and Old People's Club. We feel that all these features are sorely needed in the area and that a Church based project is best.—Yours faithfully,

- **There were other proposals for the site to be used as a community centre with the church having use of the building. Prayer, and businessman John Laing's generous promise of £2000 if the fellowship could match it, helped secure the site.**

The chairman of the Binscombe Fellowship was reported to have written to the chairman of the Town Council's Housing Committee (Cclr. W. G. Tyreman) stating that although no appeal had yet been launched, the Fellowship held funds amounting to nearly £500, and a promise of help from a nationally well-known business man amounted to a further £2,000. When erected, the buildings—which would include a chapel—would be used for a Women's Fellowship, a Sunday School, Boys' Club, Youth Fellowship and a Men's Movement. In addition, they would like to place the premises at the disposal of the Old People's Welfare Committee during the daytime in the week.

Binscombe social centre plea

AN appeal to the "powers that be" to lease land at Binscombe for use as a site for a social centre, was made by Alderman J. T. Simmonds to Godalming Council on Tuesday.

"I approve of this church site at Binscombe," declared Alderman Simmonds. "It is long overdue."

"I appeal to the powers that be. There is something else needed in that part of the borough . . . a social centre.

"I think we should lease them some land for proposed social facilities."

**New church for
Binscombe site**

Godalming Borough Council decided on Friday last week to let land to the Binscombe Christian Fellowship "... for use as a site for the erection of a Christian church and for ancillary church purposes. for a term of 99 years at a ground rent of £50 a year ..."

The land is part of the Binscombe Farm estate.

- The plan to build the church had its opponents.
- In spite of opposition the council rented the site to the church at the low price of £50 a year.

Church site dispute

GODALMING Council Tenants' Association has protested to the town council against its decision to let a site for a church on the Binscombe Farm Estate at the "concessional rent" of £50 a year.

The land has been leased to the Binscombe Christian Fellowship—described by the tenants' association as a "a small and little-known religious sect or organisation with a comparatively small membership—for a period of 99 years.

Because of the agreement, the tenants argue, the fellowship will now be subsidised—probably to the extent of £100 a year—by the housing revenue account at the expense of the general body of the tenants.

While acknowledging this to be true the council says that it was influenced in its decision to a large extent by the full support given to the fellowship by Godalming's Free Church Federal Council.

The association is being assured that the £50 rent would be credited to housing revenue account.

USE OF BINSCOMBE CHURCH SITE

Plans submitted on behalf of the Binscombe Christian Fellowship for the site on Binscombe housing estate allocated for a church show a proposal to erect buildings in two stages.

Godalming Council were told last week that the first stage included three classrooms, kitchen, store and lavatories; and the second stage, a main hall capable of seating 150 people. A car park was shown at the front with accesses from Loseley Road and Barnes Road.

- On March 2nd a trust was set up and a 99yr lease of the site was agreed with the local council – *‘to erect a building on the said land... to be used occupied and enjoyed as a place for the public worship of God by the members of Binscombe Evangelical Church for the Biblical instruction of children and adults and for such other charitable purposes for the advancement of religion as may be determined by the said Church not being political meetings secular entertainments or meetings tending to the propagation of doctrines at variance with the doctrines set forth in the Statement of Doctrine’*
- The trustees were a group of local evangelical leaders who advised the young church in these early days of its formation.

Trust Deed Statement of faith...

1. The full inspiration of the Holy Scriptures; their authority and sufficiency as not only containing, but being in themselves, the Word of God; the reliability of the New Testament in its testimony to the character and authorship of the Old Testament; and the need of the teaching of the Holy Spirit to a true and spiritual understanding of the whole.
2. The unity of the Godhead and the divine co-equality of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; the sovereignty of God in creation, providence, and redemption
3. The utter depravity of human nature in consequence of the fall, and the necessity for regeneration.
4. The true and proper Deity of our Lord Jesus Christ; His virgin birth; His real and perfect manhood; the authority of His teaching, and the infallibility of His utterances; His work of atonement for sinners of mankind by His vicarious sufferings and death; His bodily resurrection and His ascension into Heaven; and his present priestly intercession for His people.

Trust Deed Statement of faith continued...

5. The justification of the sinner solely by faith, through the atoning merits of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.
6. The necessity of the work of the Holy Spirit in regeneration, conversion, and sanctification; also in ministry and worship.
7. The ordinances of Baptism and the Lord's Supper as being instituted by our Lord Jesus Christ, but not in Baptism as conveying regenerating grace, nor in the Lord's Supper as being a sacrifice for sin or involving any change in the bread and wine.
8. The personal return of the Lord Jesus Christ in glory.
9. The resurrection of the body; the judgment of the world by our Lord Jesus Christ, with the eternal blessedness of the righteous and the eternal punishment of the wicked.

MILE...**



Most people have heard of the valuable 'Square Mile' in the City of London centred around the Bank of England, but this leaflet is to acquaint Christian friends of another square mile – a neglected one – shown on the plan overleaf. This is the Binscombe area on the outskirts of Godalming in Surrey and within it live more than 6,000 people – roughly one third of the total population of the borough.

In this square mile there is no Church or Chapel of any description but through the co-operation of the local Council an excellent site shown on the photograph overleaf – perhaps the only one available in the area – has been leased to us for the purpose of public worship. This is indeed a wonderful opportunity to proclaim that 'Jesus Christ is Lord'.

The Binscombe area is a little isolated. Travelling facilities, especially on Sundays, are not good and as a result many young people are growing up without any religious influence. We earnestly desire to meet this urgent need by starting to build as soon as possible.

This is exciting news to many, and we are grateful to our building friends, voluntary and otherwise, whose hard work has made this possible. We are also indebted to all those who have contributed and promised the necessary funds which now total £3,050.

We have decided at an estimated cost of £4,000, to proceed without a pause to the second stage of the building. Counting on the continued generous giving of Christian friends we are sure that we will not be disappointed.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

When Mrs. I. May and her family moved to Binscombe in 1957, it became apparent that there was a need for a Christian witness in the area. As so often must have happened in New Testament times, neighbours were invited in to listen to the Gospel. The informal meeting grew in numbers, and several conversions took place, whilst other friends renewed their former faith in Christ.

The local Council had reserved a church site on the nearby estate, and when the local churches were unable to develop it, the friends meeting at Timbers launched a building fund in the faith that God would open a way to build a house of prayer and evangelism. The whole area was developing rapidly, and while the other churches were doing what they could, it was evident that active help on the spot was urgently needed.

Following a special mission conducted on the present church site by Mr. J. Bathgate, a Sunday School was added to the activities at Timbers, and this proved to meet a need among children who did not attend any other church.

God honoured the faith of those who had launched the new scheme, and although the years that followed were full of difficulties, He provided for the embryo church fellowship in gifts and promises. Other helpers were raised up, and through the late Mr. Malcolm Campbell an independent Trust was established. A ground lease was negotiated with the Borough Council, plans drawn up and passed, and the building commenced in May, 1964.

The church has been partly built by the voluntary efforts of members and friends, but a great debt of gratitude is owed to Messrs. Jackson & Gocher Ltd., and the sub-contractors, who have shown such an interest in the scheme.

The present building, designed by Mr. Anthony Clare, is the first stage in what it is hoped will eventually be a church to seat 150 people, and accommodation for a comprehensive programme for the thousands living around us.

Man's need for forgiveness through a Living Saviour is as great as ever, and we pray that we may be kept true to the Word of God in our endeavours to fulfill the command of Christ to "Go . . . tell."

‘DO-IT-YOURSELF’ CHURCH OPENED

ONE hundred and eighty people — double the normal capacity of the new “do-it-yourself” Binscombe Evangelical Church—went to the church on Saturday afternoon for the official opening.

“We dug the foundations, laid the oversite concrete and did the decorating ourselves,” explained church secretary Mr. Peter Stock afterwards. “The remainder of work we put out to contract. We reckon we saved about £2,000 by doing this.”

The way to make the greatest impact on the neighbourhood was to let the people see that the church was throbbing with life and vitality. This would attract more people than spending money on publicity.





All barriers of shyness went to the wind and as a result all the later additions to the fellowship, myself included, now find it much easier in open prayer, Bible study and general fellowship. More than anything else we all found and amazing nearness to the Lord - probably because we had to rely on Him to such an extent - and came back full of the Spirit.

The following is an article she wrote for a church magazine during her later years, recording the story of Binscombe Church.



MY TESTIMONY OF GOD'S FAITHFULNESS

One of the joys of advancing years is that one can look back and see God's hand at work in the joys and sorrows of the past. When I was young with two small children I often wondered why, in 1945, ^{by a plane crash} my husband was the only person in Godalming to be blown up and so severely injured that when he eventually took to an invalid chair, our doctor suggested we should move from our house on the top of Holloway Hill to somewhere on level ground and nearer the shops. I eventually bought a cedarwood bungalow which I named 'Timbers', in a small village on the outskirts of a large housing estate at Binscombe, Godalming. On my walk to Godalming Baptist Church on Sundays, which totalled nine miles by the end of the day I had ample time to think about the people living on the estate and their lack of any place of worship, although a site had been reserved for a church, but at that time was a dumping ground for beds, tyres, old cars, washing machines etc.

I prayed for these people and eventually became so burdened I could not sleep. One Friday night I said, "Lord, if anybody mentions the need of these people tomorrow, I will open my house as a church," but when I thought of my invalid husband and two teenage children I hoped nobody would, and tried to make sure

they would not by going off to Guildford for the day with my daughter. On our return, while having tea, two young men from Godalming Baptist Church arrived and joined us; when out of the blue, one turned to me and said, "Mrs. May if ever there was a need for somebody to open their house for a church it is here." I could hardly believe my ears, for once I could not speak but later went to see Rev. Stephen Madden, the Minister of the Godalming ^{Baptist} Church, who said, "If the Lord has spoken, do it." My mother and I went off to the estate armed with a bundle of invitation cards which resulted in nineteen people arriving on the first Wednesday in September 1957 for our evening service taken by Mr. Sidney Butcher, the then Secretary of Godalming Baptist Church, who spoke on Phil. 3:10 'That I may know Him, and the power of His resurrection.' That became our goal through the years. God blessed those gatherings, numbers increased, several conversions took place and others renewed their former faith in Christ. Three years later we started a Sunday School and I look back on those days with real joy. We could not cope with the children who came in the summer, if fine we had them in the garden, but in winter we even had classes in the bathroom which was most inconvenient at times and also

had its disadvantages!

Two years later we started a Sunday evening service. In 1963 the Council sent to all Godalming churches asking if they wanted to build a church on the site at Binscombe. They all replied, "No!" My daughter-in-law who took the minutes of the Council meeting told me the Council had decided to erect a building for a Youth Centre and Bingo Hall. "Never" I said, "I will claim it for the Lord." At our next mid-week service I put a collecting box on the mantleshelf. I well remember one night lying awake thinking, "what have I done? How can we build this church?" Money seemed very slow coming in but the Lord seemed to say, "Give what you have" and when we did, and also wrote to Sir John Laing - who gave £1 for every £1 collected - we had no more money troubles. We collected the first £1000 and eventually plans were drawn up and passed, and building commenced in May 1964. God was so good to us. On March 6, 1965 I formally opened Binscombe Evangelical Church, Rev. Cyril Chilvers led the Service of Dedication and Rev. Gilbert Kirby gave the address. Within a short while it became obvious that the building was not large enough to cater for all the demands made upon it, so

a second period of building commenced with a hall and extension of the Church. Again volunteers helped to reduce the cost, and again Sir John Laing came to our aid. The enlarged premises were opened in March 1969 by Rev. David Pawson. In 1972, £8000 was raised for the building of a manse and in 1974 a lounge, classroom and storage space were added. In February 1972 we called our first Pastor, Rev. Barry Shucksmith. Dr. Martin Lloyd-Jones spoke at the Induction Service, for it was he who had introduced our Pastor. One could tell so much more of the Lord's working. It has all been of the Lord's doing and it is marvellous in our eyes.

It was lovely going home to Godalming a few weeks ago when a young married woman came up to me and said, "Do you remember me, Mrs. May?" I did not, so she said, "I'm Sue Hoad. I used to be in your Sunday School class at 'Timbers!'"

New church to meet the growing congregation

BINSCOMBE will gain a new 'landmark' in the form of a church that will help meet the needs of a growing congregation, after a planning application was approved.

Councillors voted in favour at Wednesday's area planning committee meeting to bulldoze Binscombe's current place of worship, for the erection of a 'modern' church which would be 'better suited to serving the community'.

The new church, which will sit on the current Binscombe Church site in Loseley Road,

will have increased activities to serve the community during the week and a cafe space will be created in a bid to become the 'hub' of the building.

Binscombe's pastor Pete Hitchcock said he is 'thrilled' with the decision.

He said: "We have been working towards this for a long time now, driven by a growing congregation.

"It is going to be a lot larger, which means we can do a lot more for the community, and have a better home for our

church family."

Mr Hitchcock said the new place of worship will be an investment for future church goers. "We are very grateful to councillors for supporting it unanimously," he said. "We really value their support in that."

The proposal also includes alterations to the parking layout and landscaping.

At present there are five vehicle parking spaces located at the front, with a further nine spaces to the side.

The new plans would

include the re-configuration of the existing car parking to provide 17 parking spots in addition to covered cycle shelters.

The proposed new building would be part two storey, part single storey, with a partially winged, partially flat roof and will have an entrance foyer, two halls, kitchen facilities and three meeting rooms.

Within the design and access statement put together by Allen Associates Architect LTD, it states: "We believe the amended design reflects the

suggestions made in the pre-application response and results in a building that will be a landmark and contribute significantly to the overall quality and character of the area."

The existing building currently accommodates two nursery groups, a senior citizens' social group, a children's club, a number of coffee mornings and various youth groups.

During the course of a week around 30 toddlers' families and 80 young children use the

building and the 'limitations' of the building restrict the provision and catering of these activities.

The Sunday Morning Church service attracts a congregation of around 110 people meaning the current building is 'overcrowded'.

The report continues: "The proposed building would be of a scale that would increase the scope to accommodate existing activities whilst giving potential to provide for the future aspirations of the church."






